How to Use the Kids One Year Bible

The Kids One Year Bible (Kids OYB) is designed to include the core narrative(s) of Scripture, while also keeping it bite-sized for young Christians. There are 72 days of Scripture reading included, so if you read everyday, your child will hear the core stories of Scripture 5 times in a year!

We want the Kids OYB to be a sustainable rhythm for your family, so each section of Scripture should take roughly 10 minutes to read out loud.

Next to each day's reading is a bubble for your child to fill in. Once your child has filled in every bubble, they will get to pick a prize + they will get a new Kids OYB.

- Read every day.
- Have your child fill in the bubble after each reading.
- When all bubbles are filled, they get a prize + a Kids OYB!

Background Summaries

We want your child to understand the stories of Scripture, but we also want them to know how the story fits together. The Kids OYB only includes the most pivotal stories, so summaries are provided to explain key details not in the readings. Passages with a summary have an asterisk(*), and the summary should be read before that day's reading.

How to Pray with Your Child

Praying is how we build a relationship with God. It is important that our kids know God – not just know about God. A simple way to teach your kids to pray is to use the Lord's Prayer. Teach them to:

- A. Talk to God relationally**
"our Father in heaven, holy be your name..."
- B. Pray for things God cares about**
"your kingdom come, your will be done..."
- C. Ask God to supply your needs**
"give us this day our daily bread..."
- D. Ask God for forgiveness**
"forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin..."
- E. Ask for his guidance**
"lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil..."

Background Summaries

Genesis 25

After Isaac's life was saved, he grew up and began looking for a wife. His mother and father wanted him to marry someone from among their own people, so they sent a servant to find Isaac a suitable wife. The servant asked God to give him a clear sign for knowing who he should bring back for Isaac - God answered his prayer through Rebekah.

Exodus 1

Even though Joseph's brothers sold him into slavery, God used Joseph to provide for his family during the famine. After the famine, Jacob, Joseph, and Joseph's brothers died, and the people of Israel continued to live in Egypt.

Joshua 2

Because they did not trust God, the Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 years. All of the people God rescued out of Egypt died in the desert, except for Joshua and Caleb. Moses died before entering the Promised Land, and God chose Joshua to lead the Israelites into the Promised Land.

Judges 4

God fought for the Israelites, and they continued to conquer the land with Joshua in command. After the Israelites were living in the Promised Land, they began to disobey God by sinning and worshiping other gods. God chose people called "Judges" to lead and correct His people, but the Israelites continued sinning.

1 Samuel 3

Hannah was a faithful woman who could not have children. A priest named Eli told Hannah that God would give her a son, and Hannah promised that she would give her son back to the Lord to serve Him.

2 Samuel 5

Saul took his own life in battle, and Jonathan was killed. David grieved the loss of Israel's first king, Saul, and David's best friend, Jonathan.

Background Summaries

1 Kings 11

Solomon built the temple, following the instructions that his father David left. Even though Solomon was wise, his heart became hardened against the Lord. The people of Israel were eventually divided into two separate kingdoms (Israel and Judah) because of Solomon's son, Rehoboam.

1 Kings 18

After Rehoboam, the kings of Israel were wicked. When king Ahab and queen Jezebel ruled in Israel, they worshiped the false god Baal and did things that made God angry, so God called a prophet named Elijah. God speaks through prophets to tell people his message.

2 Kings 22

After Solomon, all of the kings of Israel were wicked, and there were only a few kings of Judah who were faithful to God. Josiah was one of the good kings of Judah. He became king at only eight years old.

Daniel 6

The Lord helped Daniel explain to the king of Babylon two dreams that no one else in the kingdom could understand. Because God helped Daniel, the king made Daniel a ruler in the kingdom of Babylon. When the next king reigned, a hand appeared and wrote a warning from God on the wall, and Daniel was the only one who understood God's message.

Matthew 1

The Israelites were taken far from home, but God let them come back to their land. They rebuilt God's temple, and a man named Ezra taught them to follow God's laws. Nehemiah helped fix the walls of Jerusalem and reminded everyone to stay close to God. After that, God didn't send any new messages to His people for 400 years, and different countries ruled over Israel. But the people were waiting and hoping for the special King God had promised. Then Jesus was born, and He was that promised King!

Acts 27

After Saul became a Christian, he traveled to many different places telling people about Jesus, and the people he ministered to began to call him Paul instead of Saul.
